The present socio-psycological and sociological research "Study of gender stereotypes and hidden female discrimination in Georgia" was conducted in 1999, within the framework of the Caucasus Women's Research and Consulting Network (CWN) project.

The Caucasus Women's Network has been set up and operates on the basis of the umbrella organization International Center on Conflict and Negotiation (ICCN).

The research represents a first attempt to describe women's rights and the violation of women's rights in Georgia in psychological and sociological terms rather than from the legal perspective. It aims at the revelation of the hidden links between women's discrimination and human values, opinions and behavior.

The research highlighted a number of problems important to Georgian population. It should be mentioned that the significance and acute character of the problems also manifested itself during face to face relationship with respondents. Female respondents told the interviewers about the cases of their unfair and discriminatory treatment. The completion of the questionnaire form, given formulation of the problem and the fact that someone got interested in investigating their own experience raised hope in the women. "Will it help?"—was their question.

All this once again points to the fact that the problems related to women are definitely painful for Georgia community. They should be studied in a comprehensive way to elaborate r search-based special recommendations for the government, international organizations and other interested persons.

We hope that new data obtained in this field will help the society to realize the relevant problems and become better aware of its attitude towards them. This will represent a first step towards their solution.
